

Reading Challenge

Choose which task you would like to do and colour in the square when it is complete.

Remember: some of the tasks are worth more points than others!

Each task can only be completed once.

1 point	Make a time line of events	Sketch one of the settings in the novel and label it with relevant quotations	Choose one of the characters and write down what you know about his/her appearance and personality	Retell one of the main events of the story in your own words – or use a diagram to explain what happened.
2 points	Make a WANTED poster for one of the characters	Make a collage from magazine pictures about events in the book	Make a cartoon strip/story board showing part of the story	Write a synopsis of the story in no more than 100 words
3 points	Design a new cover for the book. Remember to include author, title, blurb, etc.	Make a travel brochure about one (or more) of the places in the story.	Write a short account showing how the character acts and reacts to a new situation – e.g. visiting a new school or a circus.	Make a Who's Who directory for the book
4 points	Complete a comparison chart showing the similarities and differences between 2 characters in the book.	Write a book review including information about the characters and the settings.	Choose one of the main characters and make a graph of his/her life through the story, showing the good and bad times.	Write about what could happen in the rest of the novel. Try to come up with at least three possibilities.
5 points	Write a different version of the story to read aloud to younger children.	Make up a game based on the characters and events of the book (e.g. snakes and ladders or a card game)	Imagine you have become a character in the book. Rewrite part of the story, using yourself as a new character.	Design a poster to attract others to read the book. Think about how you will make it appeal to the right readers.
6 points	Write about which character you would most like to spend the day with and why.	Write about the part of the book you most enjoyed and explain why.	Write a letter to the author explaining what you thought were the most successful and least successful parts of the book – with reasons.	How successful was the author in getting you 'hooked' by the opening chapter? Write about the things that made you want to read on.
