- The first competitive sports fixture took place on Wednesday. Y5/6 boys' football team played at a small tournament at Pindar Leisure Centre. They played very well and looked like they would finish the evening unbeaten only for their final fixture to be ended prematurely. I am very grateful for parents who transported the children and supported and to Mrs Smith and Miss Hall for organising our team.
- We are taking part in a table tennis event next week.
- The Year 1 classes have visited Newby and Scalby Library today. As we expected, the children enjoyed their trip and were praised by the librarians for their enthusiasm and sensible attitude when they were there.
- Next week, in a first for our school, Mr Moss and Mr Gregson will be visiting Year 1 to help the
 children understand what coastguards do, why they are important to where we live and how to stay
 safe on the coast.

Dear Parent/Carer,

For every child that receives Free School Meals (FSM) school receives additional Pupil Premium funding. Even children in EYFS and KS1 who already receive Universal Infant Free School Meals (UIFSM) can apply for Free School Meals, allowing school to benefit.

What is Pupil Premium funding?

Pupil Premium funding from the government is given to schools to help pupils reach their full potential, regardless of their background or financial situation. It's provided for pupils who:

- Are registered for Free School Meals
- Have been registered for Free School Meals at any point in the past 6 years
- Are, or have been, in care
- Have parents in the armed forces

For 2022-23 we get an extra £1,385 funding for every eligible pupil who is registered for Free School Meals. This extra money could make a real difference to the quality of education and support we offer as we use this extra money to improve the educational provision and resources.

Infant Free School Meals

Currently all pupils in EYFS, Year 1 and Year 2 are entitled to a Free School Meal thanks to a government funding scheme known as Universal Infant Free School Meals (UIFSM). However, if your child is in reception, Year 1 or Year 2 and is eligible for Free School Meals according to the criteria below, **you should still complete a Free School Meal application** because school will receive the extra Pupil Premium funding.

Is my child eligible for Free School Meals?

Your child might be eligible if you access:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance or Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income
 of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on
- Universal Credit, provided you have an annual net earned income not exceeding £7,400 (£616.67 per month)





Does my child have to eat the free school meals?

No. Pupils who are registered for free school meals don't have to eat them. If you're eligible but you want your child to have packed lunches you should still register because school will receive funding which can support your child in other ways.
